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Introduction

The Courtauld is an internationally renowned centre for the teaching and research of art history and a major public gallery that works to advance how we see and understand the visual arts. Founded by collectors and philanthropists in the 1930s, the organisation has been at the forefront of the study of art ever since, through advanced research and conservation practice, innovative teaching, a renowned collection, inspiring exhibitions, and engaging and accessible activities, education, and events.

Academically, The Courtauld faculty is the largest community of art historians and conservators in the UK, teaching and carrying out research on subjects from creativity in late Antiquity to contemporary digital art forms - with an increasingly global focus. An independent college of the University of London, The Courtauld offers a range of degree programmes from BA to PhD in the History of Art, curating, and the conservation of easel and wall paintings. Its alumni are leaders and innovators in the arts, culture and business worlds, helping to shape the global agenda for the arts and creative industries.

The Courtauld cares for one of the greatest art collections in the UK, sharing these works with the public at The Courtauld Gallery in central London, as well as through loans and partnerships. The Gallery is most famous for its iconic Impressionist and Post- Impressionist masterpieces – such as Van Gogh's Self-Portrait with Bandaged Ear and Manet's A Bar at the Folies-Bergère. It showcases these paintings alongside an internationally renowned collection of works from the Renaissance through to the present day.

Founded on the belief that everyone should have the opportunity to engage with art, The Courtauld works to increase understanding of the role played by art throughout history, in all societies, and across all geographies - as well as being a champion for the importance of art in the present day. This could be through exhibitions offering a chance to look closely at world-famous works, accessible and expert short courses, events bringing art-historical research to new audiences, digital engagement, innovative school, family, and community programmes, or taking a formal qualification. The Courtauld's ambition is to transform access to art history education by extending the horizons of what this is and ensuring as many people as possible can benefit from the tools to better understand the visual world around us

Mission and History

The Courtauld's mission is to advance the understanding of the visual arts of past and present across the world, through pioneering research, innovative teaching and inspiring exhibitions, and through the sensitive stewardship of our internationally renowned collection.

Founded by collectors and philanthropists in 1932, the Courtauld has been at the forefront of developing the field of art history ever since. A research-led higher education institution, we are home to the largest community of art historians and conservators in the UK. More than 40 faculty teach and carry out research on subjects ranging from early medieval art to contemporary digital art, with an increasingly global focus.

An independent college of the University of London, and awarding University of London degrees, we offer a range of degree programmes from BA to PhD in History of Art, Conservation and Curating, drawing on the resources of our worldfamous Courtauld Gallery and art collection. We currently have more than 600 students, and our alumni are leaders and innovators in the arts, culture and business worlds, helping to shape the global agenda for the arts and creative industries.

The Courtauld Gallery is also home to one of the finest art collections in the UK. Comprising paintings, works on paper and decorative arts, the collection is especially renowned for its Impressionist masterpieces. It is owned by the Samuel Courtauld Trust. The Courtauld works closely with the Trust to advance the stewardship, development and wide public enjoyment of the collection.

Based since 1989 at London's Somerset House, we are in the midst of a major renovation and redevelopment project. The first stage of this project was completed in 2021, with the opening of the new Courtauld Gallery, café, shop and Learning Centre, and the construction of the West Wing Conservation Studios. The second phase of the project, which involves the transformation of the Courtauld's teaching premises and the creation of new premises for the institution's academic and professional staff, is due to be completed in 2027-28. In the meantime, most of The Courtauld's History of Art and Curating teaching takes place at our temporary campus at Vernon Square, with the Conservation teaching programme largely based at Somerset House.


Candidates for these roles will ideally bring:

Terms of Appointment

- Successful candidates will be appointed for an initial term of four years, with the possibility for renewal for a
 further four-year term. Appointments will commence from 1 August 2025. The role is unremunerated, but

- The Governing Board usually meets four times per year, with all meetings held in person, usually at our Vernon Square Campus in London. The appointed members may be asked to join a committee or working group of the Board; committees usually meet three or four times per year.
- Board members are expected to prepare for and attend all meetings. In addition, Board members are
 invited to support The Courtauld through attendance at a wide range of Gallery and other events and the
 annual Graduation ceremony.
- Appointments are subject to references and other disclosures, including those relating to 'fit and proper person' requirements.
